Ākia also means "to ferment; very sour, as poi. 'Ākia is sometimes referred to as the "fish poison plant" since its Roots, bark, leaves and stems were used as a poison to stupefy fish called hola which were then gathered by the early Hawaiians. The plant parts were crushed, placed in a porous container, and sunk in salt water pools. The fish were safe to eat because 'ākia is not known to be poisonous to humans. Reputable sources mention that 'ākia was used in old Hawai'i as a death penalty for those who broke kapu.

Sometimes called the "fish poison plant" since it was used by Early Hawaiians to stun fish.
