Ice Cream Bean

Inga edulis, known as ice cream-bean, joaquiniquil, cuaniquil, guama or guaba, is a fruit native to South America. It is widely grown, especially by Indigenous Amazonians, for shade, food, timber, and medicine. The branches form a broad, flat, moderately dense canopy. The tree tolerates temporarily waterlogged soils for up to 3 months. However, it can also tolerate drought seasons up to 6 months. This plant can compensate for nutrient depleted soils by fixing nitrogen with its root nodphe taste is described as resembling that of vanilla ice cream
