

Early Polynesians brought Kukui to Hawai'i generations ago. It is culturally important and is Hawaii's state tree! They withstand both steady strong winds and severe storm winds and once established, quite drought resistant. The tree has many uses: the nuts are used to supply omega-3 oil to one's diet, in crushed or roasted form to aid digestion, in sap form to help heal insect bites, sores, and chapped lips, and in mashed or liquefied form with ulu (breadfruit sap) to heal open wounds. The nut oil is used to make candles, which is why it is also known as Candlenut tree.
